Biographical Note

James A. Early and Sarah Jane Dolan (c.1864 – 1921) were married at St. John's Church, Wellesley, in 1891. They had seven children, six of whom survived until adulthood. The Earlys moved to the Wellesley area around the turn of the twentieth century. James Early took ownership of a parcel of land on Washington Street in Wellesley Hills on October 29, 1904. It was on this land that he built, the next year, what would become the family home at 93 Washington Street.

The Early family originally owned a grocery business in Newton Lower Falls in the late nineteenth century; ledgers in the collection indicate that the grocery business likely began operating in the 1890s, around the time of James and Sarah's marriage. The business was owned and operated by James.

Eleanor Mary Early (1895 – 1969) was the oldest child in the family and grew up to be a successful novelist; she never married. James and Sarah's second child was John "Jack" Joseph

Early (1896 – 1921), who served in World War I. He was one of the founders of the American Legion post in Wellesley and was elected Wellesley Selectman at the age of 23, the youngest at that time. A photograph of the young selectman is included in this collection. Jack died in 1921 of a heart attack, possibly related to his exposure to gas while fighting overseas in Europe during World War I.

Eleanor and Jack's younger siblings were Elizabeth Lee Early (1899 – 1967), Catherine Early (born and died December 18, 1900), Philip Clement Early (1901 – 1970), Edna Dorothy Early (1904 – 1979), and Catherine Joan Early (1905 – 1983).

All of the Early children attended public schools in Wellesley.

Eleanor Early

Eleanor Early graduated from Wheelock College in 1917, after which she pursued a career as a writer and journalist in Boston. She wrote for the *Boston Herald-Traveler*, the *Boston Post*, the *Record American*, and the *Boston Globe*. In the late 1930s she left Boston to join the staff of the *New York Times*. She also lived for a time in Washington, D.C. She traveled extensively, and those experiences informed her writing, which extended beyond newspaper reporting; she also was a radio commentator and magazine columnist. She wrote books on travel, cooking, and history, as well as novels. She returned to Boston just a few years before her death in 1969.

John "Jack" Early"

Jack Early attended Wellesley public schools, then went into business as a stock messenger boy. He had an early interest in the military and was an early volunteer for the U.S. Army in May 1917, as the war raged in Europe. He attended the Officer's Training Camp in Plattsburgh, New York, where he was commissioned Second Lieutenant; he was among the youngest officers in the U.S. Army at that time. In May 1917 he traveled to Camp Mills, where he joined the newly formed Rainbow Division, but then was assigned to the 166th Infantry Division and became Captain of Company L of the 3rd Division. He served with the 166th in Lorraine, France, and saw much action there; by all accounts he performed heroically and was awarded the Legion of Honor and the Distinguished Service Cross. In May 1918 he was promoted to Second Lieutenant, and later, in August 1918, he was assigned Adjutant of the 1st Battalion. In this capacity he served as a Summary Court Officer, as well as Officer in Charge of Civil Affairs and Inferior Provost Court for Rolandseck, Rolandswerth, and Unkelbach (Germany). When the Armistice was signed in November 1918, Early was still at the front; he served with the Army of Occupation until May 1919, when he returned to the States. Upon his return he established Wellesley Post 72 of the American Legion and served as its first Commander. In 1920 he was elected as a Wellesley Selectman; he was reelected in 1921 for a three-year term, but he died in Ohio of a heart attack following a Rainbow Division reunion.

Scope and Content Note

The Early Family Papers (1885 – 2006) consist of 11 document boxes, 1 Archives Oversize Box, 3 Cartons, and various oversize materials in flat file drawers. There are 4 boxes of correspondence; 5 boxes of manuscripts; 2 boxes of printed materials; an oversize box containing art projects, newsletters, and maps; and boxes containing legal and financial documents, photographs, maps and miscellaneous materials relating to the Early family. Most of

the materials date to the first two decades of the twentieth century, with others produced as early as the 1880s and as late as 2006.

The earliest materials date from the late nineteenth into the early twentieth century and include business ledgers from James A. Early's grocery business, which was located in Newton Lower Falls. The ledgers record transactions and client account information c.1890 – 1915.

Most of the materials in the Early Family Papers relate to Jack and Eleanor Early; materials created by Eleanor Early have been separated within the correspondence, manuscript, printed materials, and oversized series. The bulk of Jack Early's materials relate his service in the United States Army during World War I. Manuscripts from pre-World War I years are from the Early children's school days, c.1905-1915.

Correspondence (1885-1921) forms the largest single series in the collection and is arranged chronologically in 4 sub-series: three boxes of letters to Jack Early from family and friends during his service in WWI (1917-1919), one box of letters from Eleanor Early to Jack Early during WWI (1917-1919), 1 box of correspondence between the U.S. Army, the Lee, Higginson Service Club and Jack Early (1917-1920), and one box of correspondence to other members of the Early family (1885-1921).

Most of the newspaper clippings which were in the collection have been reproduced on archival, acid-free paper and are included with their contextual materials. Much of the paper quality in the correspondence and school papers folders is deteriorating and will need to be reproduced in the future to prevent a loss of information. Maps in Oversize as well as in Flat File Drawers are deteriorating. The covers of the ledgers in Cartons 1-3 were disintegrating with red rot; the covers have been removed, but use caution when handling these items, because red rot can cause skin irritation and allergic reactions if the dust is inhaled.

I. Correspondence

This series is divided into four sub-series of correspondence between Early family members and others, including friends and official military correspondents.

Sub-Series I: World War I Correspondence, 1917-1919

This large subseries contains correspondence to Jack Early from his parents, siblings, and friends while he was in military training in the U.S. and then overseas in France. (Correspondence to Jack Early from his sister Eleanor has been collected in Subseries II). Many of the letters come from his sister, Elizabeth, though there are also many from outside his immediate family, including letters from Margaret Pierson, who seems to have been a cousin. The family kept Jack informed of news at home and often included newspaper clippings to keep him apprised of the local and national response to the war. The letters reveal a close-knit family and an affectionate mother who were concerned for Jack's safety and well-being while he was in Europe. Box 3, Folder 9 contains a copy of a letter sent to Eleanor Early by Father Carpenter, a priest, upon the death of Jack Early.

Subseries II: Letters from Eleanor Early to Jack Early, 1917-1919

This subseries contains Eleanor Early's letters to Jack, and reveal a quick wit and an easygoing sister-brother relationship based on mutual affection. Eleanor wrote these wartime letters while establishing herself as a journalist in Boston, thus she often included samples of her own writing and also other newspaper stories she thought her brother would enjoy.

Subseries III: Early Family Correspondence, 1885-c.1939

The earliest letters in this subseries date to 1885, before Sarah Jane Dolan married James Andrew Early; most of Sarah Dolan Early's papers are located at the Newton Historical Society. One folder in this sub-series contains letters written to Eleanor, both from her brother Jack and a Lieutenant Larry; Eleanor's relationship to Larry is unclear. Folder 3 contains letters written in school to Philip Early from his classmates, all dated November 27, 1911; he was ill and unable to attend school for a time, and they wish him well.

The oldest photograph is a photocopy of a photo taken of James Andrew Early when he was 21 years old. Miscellaneous photographs are included here. There is also a postcard book of

This series contains nine business ledger books from James A. Early's grocery business, which was located in Newton Lower Falls. Receipts and other information in the ledger books contain letterhead which states, "James A. Early, dealer in Fine Family Groceries,

Flour and Grain. Agent for the Cunard Steamship Co. Newton Lower Falls, Mass." These ledger books track the shopping accounts of many Wellesley and Wellesley area residents, and are arranged alphabetically by name, with an index in the front, followed by records and accounts associated with each name. Often receipts and other documents are interleaved with the records pages.
